



RAJYOGINI DADI JANKI

Chief of Brahma Kumaris

BIOGRAPHY

Rajyogini Dadi Janki has had a distinguished career in developing and administrating the work of the Prajapita Brahma Kumari Ishwariya Vishwa Vidyalaya of which she is now the Administrative Head at the great age of 91 years.

Overcoming the constraints of social conventions including the caste system, Dadi Janki became one of the few active women spiritual leaders, just following India's independence, travelling throughout India, teaching self-reliance and empowering women to become leaders in their communities.

From Dadi Janki's early days, a concern for the well-being of others was a driving force in her life. Her primary education consisted of the study of the Indian scriptures, many of which she learnt by heart.

Through much of her life, Dadi Janki endured a series of illnesses that both tested and helped her to develop and refine her ability to conquer physical infirmity. These early experiences helped to prepare her for a unique role during the foundation years of the Ishwariya Vishwa Vidyalaya, which was later to become a world-wide educational organisation. Between 1937 and 1951, 400 pioneers, mostly women, lived together in conditions that were sometimes physically daunting. Dadi Janki was appointed nurse to the community, a role that demanded arduous work as well as skill.

Dadi Janki reached Britain in 1974 to coordinate the first centre of Brahma Kumaris to be established outside of India and to inspire self reliance and the development of spiritual values in a Western society. She inspired women to develop greater self-esteem and self-help skills. Thousands from all faiths and cultures have benefited from her wisdom, unfailing encouragement and support in times of need. Through her equality of vision, Dadi inspired millions to go beyond their differences and live together in harmony.

Under her guidance and inspiration centres of the Ishwariya Vishwa Vidyalaya now exist throughout the UK and in over 100 countries world-wide. All centres are involved in outreach work, supporting positive change in society and strengthening the people. Teachers and students conduct programmes in hospitals, schools, prisons and hostels with refugees, street children, prostitutes, terminally ill patients and addicts and in other community contexts. Dadi has personally visited and participated in many of these projects in over 100 countries.

Dadi has pioneered the development of several international projects (in 129 countries) developing vision, values and action at a grass roots level, empowering individuals and communities to improve their own quality of life and the environment.

Dadi is one of the 'Keepers of Wisdom', an eminent group of spiritual and religious leaders, who advise political leaders on the fundamental spiritual dilemmas which underpin current worldwide issues of the environment and human settlement. The

Wisdom Keepers were convened at the United Nations Earth Summit in Rio and at Habitat II in Istanbul.

In 1997, the Janki Foundation for Global Health Care was established and launched in her honour in London.

Throughout her many years of work, Dadi works for an integral approach of education to include healthy emotional, spiritual, creative and social development.

1974-present

- Overseeing the expansion of the work of the Ishwariya Vishwa Vidyalaya into 84 countries, demonstrating the universality of spiritual truths and human nature across the cultures of East and West
- Travelled to more than 80 countries visiting community projects, addressing major conferences and events and meeting world leaders in many fields, including those of politics, religion and science

1951 - 1974

- One of few women spiritual leaders in India (and the world), establishing teaching centres across the length and breadth of the country. She empowered individuals to bring spiritual values into their lives and women in particular to develop self-reliance and leadership skills, setting aside the constraints of social convention and the caste system

1938 - 1951

- In charge of health care and general nurse for the community

1937 - 1951

- Training in leadership skills which, for women, was an unprecedented challenge to the social conventions of the time

1937

- Joined the Ishwariya Vishwa Vidyalaya, at that time a 400 strong community of mainly women

1916

- Born in the Northern Indian province of Sindh (now part of Pakistan)
